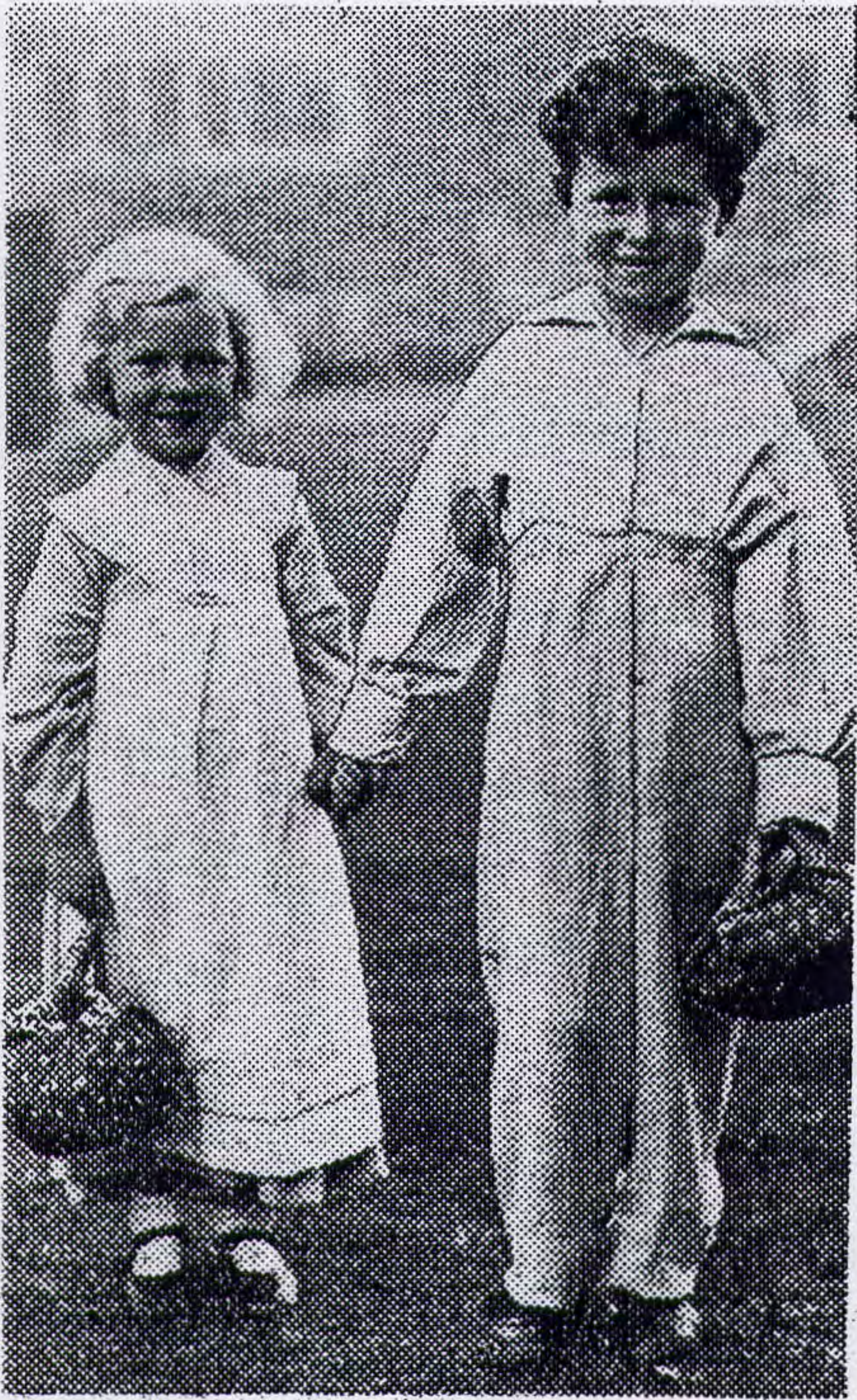


A BOATLOAD OF FREEBOOTERS from the Isle of Oxney.

The final episode showed emigrants leaving Tenterden for America, taking with them Caxton's book.

The epilogue jumped to 1928, when an American visitor presented Caxton's book to the Mayor of the borough, and thus gave Tenterden a relic which will for ever be a reminder of the pioneer of printing and his association with the town.

The pageant concluded with a grand

march past of the performers in colourful costumes, representing many stages of history.
